THE SERMON ON THE MOUNT

Beatitudes of the Kingdom

During the coming year (apart from Lent and Easter), we will read from the Gospel of Matthew at Sunday Mass. In this Gospel, Jesus gives five great sermons: The Sermon on the Mount (chapters 5-7), the Missionary Sermon (chapter 10), the Sermon of Parables (chapter 13), the Sermon on Church Order (chapter 18), and the Sermon about the End of the Ages (chapters 24-25). In each of these five sermons, Jesus teaches us how to live in a way that conforms to the kingdom of heaven that he proclaims. In the next few columns, I will discuss Jesus's first sermon, the Sermon on the Mount.

Jesus delivers the Sermon on the Mount at the beginning of his ministry so that his disciples will know how to live according to the kingdom of heaven that he proclaims. The central theme of his sermon is practicing the greater righteousness, by which Jesus means conduct that accords with God's law. To practice this greater righteousness, Jesus tells the disciples that they must be "perfect, just as your Heaven Father is perfect" (5:48). By this statement, Jesus means that the disciples must be single-minded and undivided in their devotion to God just as God is single-minded and undivided in his devotion to them. Disciples cannot serve two masters and expect to practice the greater righteousness. They cannot be

divided in their devotion to God. The greater righteousness that Jesus proclaims requires total commitment to God.

The sermon begins with eight beatitudes (5:3-12) in which Jesus announces the blessings of the kingdom that come to those who surrender their lives to God. In the first part of each beatitude, Jesus describes the life of discipleship. For example, his disciples are the poor in spirit, the meek, the merciful, those who work for peace. Then, in the second part of the beatitude, he describes the blessings that come to such people. The kingdom of heaven belongs to them. In the new age that the kingdom is bringing, they will inherit the land. They will receive mercy. They will be called the children of God.

After these eight beatitudes, Jesus pronounces a ninth beatitude in which he tells his disciples to rejoice when they are persecuted and spoken ill of because of him; for this the way they treated the prophets of old.

The beatitudes set the tone for the rest of the sermon. They describe the character of his disciples and the blessing that come upon them. Because they entrust themselves entirely to God, they will inherit the blessings of the kingdom.

After announcing the blessings of the kingdom, Jesus employs two metaphors to describe his disciples. They are (1) the salt of the earth and (2) the light of the world because they are his disciples (5:13-16). Even though the world hates and despises them because they are Jesus's disciples, they are the salt that preserves the world from evil and gives it flavor. They are the light that dispels the darkness of sin. Such is the exalted vocation of being Jesus's disciples. 



REVOIR SCHOLARSHIP

The Martha and Kenneth Revoir Scholarship was established in 2016 by Kenneth Revoir in memory and in honor of his mother, Martha Revoir, a parishioner of Saint Maurice Church, now known as St. Francis Parish. The Scholarship is primarily to provide financial assistance to eligible students who have been members of Saint Francis Parish for at least the year prior to application. Scholarships of a minimum of \$2,500 may be awarded to full time students who are enrolled at accredited colleges, universities or community colleges, or are pursuing a course of study which will prepare them for a trade or profession at an accredited educational facility which awards degrees or certificates and has a full-time faculty. High school seniors who will be enrolled at an accredited educational facility by June for the fall semester are also eligible to apply. It was Mr. Revoir's intention, in creating the scholarship trust, to assist eligible students pursue the education for which they are qualified and which they wish to pursue in order to become useful, productive citizens.

Scholarships may include assistance with tuition, fees, books, and living expenses.

All applications will be sent to the Scholarship Committee at St. Francis of Assisi Parish. Scholarship applications that contain all of the requirements needed to apply may be obtained at the Saint Francis of Assisi Office (860) 224-2411 or contact parishoffice@stfranciscatholic.org. Failure to enclose the required materials and to meet the deadlines will cause the application to be deemed incomplete and it will not be forwarded to the Trustees for consideration.

Application deadline is March 15, 2026.


